# 2005-2006 Annual Report

## Chair's Report

The past year has truly been the most remarkable landmark year since the Forum started in 1993.

Among the many highlights have been:

**Record** individual membership reaching a peak 754

**Steady** growth in the number of organisations of older people affiliating to the Forum

**Survey** completed by over 600 people on toilet facilities in the Borough

**Launching** with Enfield Strategic Partnership and Enfield Council the first strategic plan for older people in the Borough

**Increased** physical activity by older people using special discounts at leisure centres negotiated by the Forum.

That all this and very much more was achieved is a tribute to the Forum's officers and committee listed on the front of this annual report - and to those Forum members outside the Committee who play a leading role on various Council and Primary Care Trust committees - aiming to improve services for older people.

This annual report and the Forum's performance in the past year should be judged against our own objectives for the Forum which are to:

- **Make** life better for older people in Enfield
- **Ensure** we are a party to all decisions involving older people
- **Provide** accurate information of interest to older people
- **Have** informative speakers at our monthly meetings
- **Organise** events and opportunities for members to socialise
- **Campaign** against discrimination and injustices
- **Influence** national and local government on matters affecting older people such as pensions, council tax, health, crime, leisure etc, etc.
- **Work** in partnership with local, regional and national organisations in support of the above objectives.

So how have we measured up to the above formidable list of objectives taking into account that we are all volunteers, save for one part-time lottery-funded development officer? It should be recorded at the outset that without this funding, and without the work put in by Olivia Goodfellow - which far exceeds her paid duties - the Forum would be nothing like as strong as it is today.

With lottery funding ending in May 2007, it is incumbent on the new Committee in the coming year to

build up reserve funds and alternative sources of permanent funding so that her post is secured for many years to come. Everyone reading this report of the past year's work must recognise that an integral part of any success we have had is due to our having paid assistance. The local statutory organisations that have relied on the Forum to support their endeavours must equally recognise that they have some responsibility for maintaining the Forum as a flourishing organisation in the years to come.

### Membership and Meetings

The past year has seen record attendances at meetings on a variety of subjects ranging from the future of Chase Farm Hospital, the Council's Budget, updates on the work of the Primary Care Trust, the work of trading standards and the police to talks on lifelong learning, diabetes, dentistry services, life at the Palace of Westminster by Forum member Peter Horsfall and Councillor Bill Price, the Mayor, on Enfield's business history to one on healthy food and drinks with a speaker from Waitrose.

Your Committee tries to find speakers on topics that warrant you leaving home and coming to meetings, enabling you to be better informed than people who are not members of the Forum.

The largest meeting of older people in the year was for the launch of the consultation document on the Borough's new strategic plan for older people attended by some 200 representatives of organisations and individuals. The day-long conference was chaired by the Forum's chairman and the Forum arranged the keynote speakers. We are closely monitoring developments in this area to ensure that the conference follow-up leads to positive developments.

Our membership obviously fluctuates during the year, but at its peak it grew from 220 individual members in 2004 to 754 members in 2005, At 31 March 2006 we had a record 582 members who had already renewed their membership until 31 March 2007. Over 40 organisations of older people in the Borough are now affiliated to the Forum. (A full list is given in Appendix I to this report). These organisations combined have a membership running into many thousands including, for example, Heart Throbs. a cardiac special interest group with 400 members, the 1000 strong Cypriot Association, 290 members of the Assoc. of Jewish Ex-Servicemen and Women and the 700-strong Unison retired members. Together we can claim that with our affiliates

the Forum is the most representative voice of older people in the Borough.

Our members are to be found serving the Forum in many ways. **Jean Calvert**, for example, was a prominent member of the special Health Scrutiny Panel team which investigated stroke services in the Borough; **Des Hegarty** is a member of the PCT's coronary and heart disease local implementation group; **Derek Friggens** attends the healthy lifestyles group and is active in his local CAPE group. **Peter Smith** is a member of the Police Incidents Advisory Group. Forum secretary **Tony Watts** is a Board member of the Enfield Strategic Partnership, trustee of Age Concern Enfield and co-chairs the new and important thematic action group on older people which is charged with implementing the new strategic plan. **Brian Wright** has represented the Forum most vigorously on the fairer homecare charging working party. **Carmel Wright** has joined the voluntary sector's health and social care group. **Monty Meth** is a member of the PCT's national service framework local implementation team, **Don Smith**, **Liz Henthorn** and **Myra Godsmark** are among Forum members attending and keeping watch at scrutiny panel meetings and Forum vice-chairman **Roy Barrows** represents older people on the board of Enfield Leisure Centres Trust. We also attend meetings of the Greater London Forum and the London Older People's Strategy Group which all helps us to know what is going on in other Boroughs and nationally regarding older people and we continue to be affiliated to the National Pensioners Convention and its Greater London Region.

The more widely known the Form becomes, the greater demand there is for us to participate in partnership working with other organisations. So we sorely need more people to come forward to represent the Forum in whatever way they can. Every extra pair of hands would enable us to do so much more.

### **New Structure**

The Forum's growth with its range of new activities and the demands that are put upon its officers requires some new thinking about the way we work and operate. Unless a fairy godmother drops from the sky we cannot see how we will have the resources to employ a full-time worker, although there is more than enough to do in keeping up with national and local developments. There is now more research than ever concerning older people, more conferences and seminars, more papers and meetings to read and attend. And if we are serious about representing older people we have to be on top of these matters so that we can discuss them with all those in authority be it the local council members and officers, MPs, police, health officials etc.

So we not only need more people to play an active role, we need to be better organised to spread the load possibly by appointing or electing a vice-chair responsible for developing a team that will look after fitness and health; a vice chair with responsibility for the Forum's strategy and direction - ensuring that we concentrate on issues in line with our objectives - and a coordinator that will work more closely with our affiliated organisations..

This kind of team effort would be immensely strengthened by us having a home of our own and so we ought in the next year strive to find conveniently situated office space which ideally could become an information centre for older people preferably staffed by the local authority.

### **Newsletter**

Undoubtedly, a key weapon in maintaining and expanding our membership and influence is through our Newsletter, which came out on time every two months last year. We are now circulating about 4,500 copies of each issue - 2000 up on last year - to members, our affiliated clubs, the 14 libraries and more than 60 surgeries and we have established some new outlets for the Newsletter in supermarkets and the leisure centres.

So we will be stepping up our circulation building by asking members to take copies for local pharmacies and shops - and also asking them to help stuff, deliver and post the growing number of copies we print. In the coming year we will be making a bigger effort to find sponsors for the Newsletter which costs some £650 per issue to print and distribute. With the increased cost of postage, it is pretty clear that we will have to raise our subscription fees next year to cover increased postage and other costs.

### **Campaigns**

Our most successful campaign to date has undoubtedly been around the questionnaire completed by more than 600 people on the lack of public toilets in the Borough. The survey was discussed by the Health Scrutiny Panel and is now firmly on the Council's agenda along with our proposal for a Council supervised community toilet scheme with grants to outlets who allow the public to use their toilets without first making a purchase. We have invited the Enfield Business and Retailers Association to endorse the scheme. We continued to expose the failure to provide toilet facilities at the new 24x7 and 26 stand bus station at Edmonton by the Council, St Modwen, the developers, and Transport for London.

We have campaigned for a change to the 25p Age addition paid at age 80 which has remained unaltered since 1971. We have pressed the issue on the Minister for Pensions and his Conservative Shadow and we have asked the Select Committee

on Work and Pensions to intervene since the issue was ignored by the Turner Commission although it spent two years looking at the pensions issue.

We participated fully in the Council's budget consultation process, campaigning against the cuts in the grant to leisure centres; the increased charges for homecare and home meals services. We complained at the absence of any spending plans on the Whitewebbs toilets and cafe facilities - but we have been promised that something will be done about them in the coming year.

Although we failed to get the Council to restore the concessionary fees to members of the Southgate College Symphony Orchestra aged over 50 or who were unemployed or had disabilities, we did help the orchestra to produce a survival plan which although it still awaits the Council's endorsement, without it the orchestra would not have reformed as an independent orchestra which continues its 40 plus years tradition of playing classical music for Enfield, audiences.

We were among the first to campaign against the £20 a year Olympic surcharge which is collected with the Council tax. It was first due to be imposed for six years which became ten years and there is now suggestions that it will last for 12 years. We objected to the tax being imposed without consultation with older people on fixed incomes, the majority of whom are unlikely to see any benefit from the Olympics in 2012. Our protest was later endorsed unanimously by Enfield Council.

Our "Get Fit for a Longer Life" campaign took many different routes last year. We continued in our endeavours to get more older people to participate in physical activity as a means of preventing or delaying the onset of many illnesses associated with the ageing process. The Over 50s fitness day at Southbury Leisure Centre on Wednesdays is not only more firmly established than ever, but classes have had to start earlier to accommodate allcomers. We are still talking with ELCT about adding another day to the programme. In this "Get Fit for a Longer Life" campaign we worked alongside the PCT in a very successful Falls Awareness Day attended by over 200 people and a Flu activity day at Edmonton leisure centre.

As a result of these activities we successfully applied to Enfield Council's sport and leisure team for funding for two free "taster" days in a bid to attract more participants. Our initiative in this field prompted us to try and secure support from the London Mayor for a London-wide scheme involving all the leisure centres in the capital, but unfortunately there was no response

We continue the campaign to encourage the maximum number of pensioners to apply for the pensions

and savings credits and the council tax rebates they are entitled to. Our joint partnership with Enfield Citizens Advice Bureau in providing a dedicated part-time worker to seek out people entitled to the pension credit lapsed during the year and only became alive again in March 2006 with the appointment of a new CAB chief executive covering Enfield, so this is something we will pursue in the coming year..

We continue at every opportunity to campaign in seeing that as many older people as possible have smoke alarms fitted in their own homes and to distribute low energy light bulbs and together with EAGA partnership we endeavour to see that as many people as possible know about the warm front insulation and energy saving schemes.

### **Social Activities**

We said last year that our Forum should not just be about meetings and campaigns. It must have a place and make time for new friendships to be formed, enabling people to join in activities as a group that they would not otherwise do on their own. Our Christmas social event in 2005 was better than ever with some first class entertainment and at the turn of the year we held a most successful Wild West evening.

Last year we had enjoyable coach trips to Canterbury and Le Touquet. and in the coming year we already have two coach trips planned to Aldeburgh and an adventurous 4-day holiday to the Rhine Valley. We need volunteers to support Carol Sivak, our social secretary, - with ideas for other social events - and will also help to organise them - and so support the Forum by making it a more vibrant body that it is a joy to belong to.

Three innovations introduced last year were the Monday evening weekly walks in Grovelands Park led by the Forum's development officer Olivia Goodfellow, augmented by Forum members participating in walks in other parks in the Borough; the first Elders Friendship day attended by over 40 people with ages ranging up to 95 who are living alone; and a self-defence tuition day.

### **Edmonton Forum**

While this offshoot Forum met regularly throughout the year with speakers ranging from local MP Andy Love, to talks on the Edmonton Green shopping development, the new Forest Road medical centre, the planned leisure centre and from the police there is still a challenge to be met in getting more local people involved. The highest attendance has been 28 and so there is a double challenge - in getting more people to attend the Forum and in taking up issues that particularly affect that part of the Borough.

With the opening of the Forest Road Medical centre in 2006 serving 18,000 patients and the new leisure

centre opening in 2007 it should be possible to use these two centres as sources for new members and a renewed effort to build the Forum still further.

## **Finance**

The Forum's financial position is detailed in Appendix II and as for last year the accounts are split between the restricted fund ( the Big Lottery Award that can only be used for the purposes specified in our grant proposal) and the unrestricted fund which covers all other income and expenditure. The unrestricted fund shows a healthy increase on the year. The significant increase in subscription income to £3,866 is due to the increased membership and because subscriptions for the 500 plus members had been already paid up to 31 March 2007 and is included in the year's accounts. The increased activities in 2005-6 and the events and trips scheduled for the coming year means that much the surplus shown for the year will be swallowed in the liabilities for these forthcoming activities.

For the restricted fund we are now in the second year of the three year grant to develop the Forum. The fund shows an expenditure of £17,452 so that there is a small underspend. As noted above the growth in membership costs have increased printing and distribution costs but this has also increased the effort needed to administer the Forum. This is reflected in the £1,100 shown for administrative support. We have still not been able to find suitable office space to lease but are fortunate that our development officer is able to operate effectively from her own home in the interim.

## **Support**

The Forum is most grateful for the support it has received from the local Council which continues to provide us with accommodation for meetings without charge. We also received £182 from a joint Council-Age Concern fund to help with administration. We

## **Conclusion**

The Forum is really only of value if it works for a future where older people are highly valued, have lives that are richer, and voices that are heard and we should be judged by how far we have advanced towards these goals.

With that in mind, we still envisage the Forum becoming the link between the many organisations of older people in the Borough, ideally working together in a new community-based partnership where people can voice their concerns and have them resolved quickly and efficiently without the run-around that is too often the case at present. That is the concept, as we see it of the new strategic plan for older people project in the Borough - which we are hoping will be publicly launched in the Autumn - and it is on that plan that we envisage advances being made in the interests of all older people in the Borough

received £425 from the Old Enfield Charitable Trust towards the costs of our coach outings and £428.88 to pay for the specially-designed Forum publicity stand that graces so many public events in the Borough; and we had a most welcome £200 from Fairview New Homes resulting from Liz Henthorn's initiative.

The decision by Brimsdown-based Warburton's bakery to sponsor the Forum was our biggest advance on this front and we had the first taste of it when almost 100 people attending our guide to Winter Healthy Food and Drink meeting left with samples of their healthy loaves. Warburton's will be sponsoring an issue of the Newsletter and their products will be seen at many Forum events during 2006. We will be urging Forum members to support the bakery that supports us.

## **Development Plan 2005 - 6**

Having achieved the key objective in our first development plan - that of securing a grant to employ a part-time development officer for the Forum - our second development plan still needs to be implemented in that we have not so far become a registered charity.

Our development plan includes embracing a Better Government for Older People organisation in the Borough and we remain hopeful that this will mature through the newly formed thematic group for older people.

Mark McLaughlin, Director of Finance and Corporate Affairs LBE, assures us that a link officer will be appointed charged with coordinating, monitoring, and implementing the strategic plan. We have failed to make any progress on seeing the Forum develop into an organisation with its own accommodation and possibly linked to an advice / social centre for older people - but this must remain a target with greater priority in the coming year.
